# The Ministers' Quill

## ***Look Ahead with Joy*** ***GUM Conversations for Change***

*I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? Isaiah 43:19*

When the Guelph area United Church congregations and ministries decided to gather, last spring, for a day of worship, sharing and re-imagining church together, the event was called “Look Ahead with Joy.” The moniker was also an invitation, inspired by ancient words of promise spoken to an exiled people. Today, the institutional church can seem to exist at a remove from the culture it inhabits. Yet, we know that God is still speaking to, and through, us. We know the Spirit of God is active in the world, inviting us into the life-giving newness it draws forth.... if we can only *perceive it*. The capacity to perceive, discern or “have eyes to see” is a common biblical theme. It speaks to people of faith everywhere and to those of us called to be the United Church in Guelph.

As we embark on a new year, our churches and non-congregational ministries have been given a remarkable opportunity to discern together the ways we are called to extend our creative collaboration as Guelph United Ministries (GUM). During the first six months of 2019, professional facilitators Rebecca Sutherns (of Sage Consulting) and Paul Miller (formerly Support Minister for Waterloo Presbytery) will lead a series of conversations toward collaborative change involving the four United Churches in Guelph (Harcourt Memorial UC; Dublin Street UC; Trinity UC and Three Willows UC) and two local, non-congregational outreach ministries that have United Church ties (the Ecumenical Campus Ministry and Chalmers Community Service Centre). The purpose of the GUM Facilitation Project, dubbed “Conversations for Change,” is to continue, and bring focus to, GUM’s ongoing work of community building (co-mission) through the steps of co-ordination, collaboration, co-operation and consolidation.

Over the years, the Guelph ministries have developed a relationship of mutual support through informal networks and collegial gatherings, collaborative projects and information sharing, as well as jointly sponsored educational and worship events. In the past two years, emerging conversations have revealed a yearning for articulation of common vision for the

ministry of the United Church in Guelph. These conversations took on new urgency in 2018, when the Boards of Trustees of the four churches initiated a series of meetings to discuss diminishing financial and human resources within each of our congregations, suggesting the need for concerted action to maintain a vital presence for the United Church in Guelph.

At a June meeting of GUM Council members, clergy and Trustees, participants recognized the value external facilitation could bring to the ongoing conversation toward collaborative change. This past November, twenty-five people from the six GUM ministries met at Trinity United Church for a “scoping meeting.” Participants got a taste of what facilitation might offer during a stimulating afternoon of discussion, led by Rebecca Sutherns and Paul Miller. Later that month, the GUM Planning and Management Circle responded by authorizing funding for a six-month process with the goal of developing a strategic plan leading to a collaborative, sustainable United Church presence in Guelph. The first meeting of the GUM Facilitation Project is now scheduled to take place in late January 2019.

A GUM Communications and Co-Ordination Team has been struck to provide support to the facilitators over the course of the *Conversations for Change* project. A representative from each church Council will sit on the team and report back, allowing congregational Councils to maintain responsibility for communication within each congregation. In this way, lay leaders will have a finger on the pulse of progress and emerging proposals. The Councils of all four congregations have been invited to provide their own endorsement and support of the GUM facilitation project.

I believe the Spirit has been active among us through the relationships and community building of Guelph United Ministries. Our communities of faith have come to know each other well and our collective engagement reveals we have much in common, yet hold distinct gifts and strengths. Might we, at this particular moment, be uniquely poised to perceive the new thing God is calling forth among us?

The prospect of exploring, through facilitated conversation, the potential for deeper commitment to co-mission with our sister churches, evokes both anticipation and trepidation. And so, we pray that the Spirit will guide our discernment and give us eyes to perceive where life-promising newness *is there*, to be seen. We pray that our nostalgia for what has been, will not impair our vision of what *might be*. And as we step into a new year that brims with possibilities, may we look back with fondness, yet look ahead with confidence *and with joy!*

# COUNCIL NEWS

Year-end business and busyness keep us thinking about the year just past and the year ahead. Council held a short meeting on December 9. We continued to focus on the 2019 draft budget. We fine-tuned projected costs for some paid program support for MANNA, and a community support worker. These positions have resulted from the discussion at the 2018 Annual Meeting and will contribute to our context of radical change. We will hold a budget briefing on February 3 after the 10:30am services. This is an opportunity before the Annual Meeting (February 24) to hear more details and ask questions. Save the dates! Please join us!



Miriam Flynn and Roz Stevenson provided an update on Guelph United Ministries (GUM). During 2018, representatives of church councils, trustees and clergy met four times to begin thinking five to ten years ahead. As a result, the GUM Planning & Management Circle (currently chaired by Miriam) has authorized funding for a facilitation process, with the goal of developing a strategic plan that will lead to a collaborative, sustainable United Church presence in the City of Guelph. They have contracted for facilitation services with Rebecca Sutherns, of Sage Solutions, and Rev. Paul Miller, recently the United Church Support Minister for Waterloo Presbytery.

To support this initiative, each church council has been asked to endorse the GUM Facilitation Process, agree to participate, and identify two individuals who will represent their church on the GUM Coordination and Communication Team (CCT). One person is to represent Council, and one is to be another lay/clergy person familiar with discussions to date. The CCT will provide information to each congregation, encourage participation in discussions, communicate ideas/priorities/suggestions/proposals for moving forward together, and give prayerful consideration to what God is calling us to do as the United Church in Guelph. As you can imagine, very important conversations will take place in the coming months.

Harcourt Council took this action:  
*Motion: To appoint Kent Hoeg and Miriam Flynn as Harcourt's two representatives to the GUM Coordination & Communication Team, in support of the facilitation project between the GUM ministries on Collaborative Change Management.*  
*Mark Sears/Carolyn Davidson Carried*

Beginning in January, we will hear more about this Facilitation Process from Kent and Miriam. We will be encouraging meaningful participation and effective communication within Harcourt as opportunities are offered. This is another 'stay tuned' priority.

Looking ahead, this is the time of year when committees, teams and Council think about recruitment for any vacant positions that might exist. I encourage anyone who would like to become more involved in Harcourt's ongoing work to step forward. I offer my personal invitation to chat with YOU to explore how your interests can be matched with opportunities. 



## Harcourt In Hot Water Again

There was a worrying incident in December in which one of the Pre-School teachers had her wallet removed from her purse and this was the second such incident, so please be careful with your belongings. At the last Property Committee meeting, considerable time was spent discussing the pros and cons of replacing the pews with chairs. The Ad Hoc Seating Committee will be contacting users shortly, asking for input.

New projects keep showing up. One of the breaker panels in Darko's Utility Room downstairs needs attention. Alan Weeks was in last week and did an amazing job of fixing the clear plexiglass window in the west-side door from the Greeting Place into the Sanctuary. That window got partly pushed out of the door. It looked like someone fell heavily into the window and partially dislodged the window from the door. The heating system in the Friendship room is shortly going to need some attention. The transformation from regular lights to LED replacements is nearly complete. The Property Committee is over budget but rebates are coming in from Guelph Hydro to partially offset the expenditures.

## Peter's Fragments: *Bits and Pieces of Wisdom*

*"I shall pass through this world but once. Any good therefore that I can do or any kindness that I can show to any human being, let me do it now. Let me not defer or neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again."*

This saying is attributed to Stephen Grellet, a French-born Quaker missionary in the early 19th century. The words may sound a little stiff and old-fashioned, but the sentiment is bang up to date, echoing Jim Ball's benediction that encourages us to hasten always to kindness.

A perhaps more challenging encouragement comes from Khalil Gibran, a Lebanese-American poet writing about 90 years ago:

*"All you have shall some day be given;  
Therefore give now, that the season of giving may be yours."*

Most of us are familiar with the Biblical tithe (ten percent) of income as a guideline for our financial giving. Could the season of giving be different from that more familiar kind of stewardship?

A clue comes in Matthew Colwell's book *Sabbath Economics: Household Practices*. It refers to accumulated wealth or savings as 'surplus capital', and says that "some of us have too much surplus capital, and others have too little".

During the years when we are accumulating wealth, the goal seems obvious: to have enough to live on and a rainy-day fund big enough to take care of emergencies and contingencies such as the need to pay for nursing care later in life. But the question that Matthew raises is: could a rainy-day fund be too big? The answer seems to depend on how robust we think our fund needs to be, and how much risk we are willing to accept by reducing that fund so as to gain the joy of giving now.

The beginning of the new year is a good time to reflect on our stewardship and in what ways each of us can make this our 'season of giving'.


